MINISTER'S COLUMN, Scott Couper

Dear Friends in Christ:

I inherited a wonderful responsibility from The Rev. Carra Bradt and from The Rev. Burt Marshall – and thus I inherited it from the Centre Congregational Church (United Church of Christ). As minister of the Centre Church, I with two other clergy colleagues (Father Justin Baker of St. Michael's Catholic Church and The Rev. Mary Lindquist of St. Michael's Episcopal Church) administer The Edward A. Lyon Trust.

Grants from the Lyon's Trust are given specifically to young people (under forty) residing in Windham County, Vermont for the purpose of assisting them in acquiring a vocational education. For example, nursing (LPN), dental hygiene, hairdressing, cosmetology, industrial arts, apprenticeship, and on the job training. Unlike many grants, the Lyon's grant does not contribute to four-year tertiary education. All grants are paid directly to the institution of learning.

By reading Edward Lyon's Last Will and Testament, we learn that Edward was from Burlington, Vermont but is buried in the Morningside Cemetery in Brattleboro. Edward's will indicated that he wished to assist young people "who by reason of ability, financial circumstances, or otherwise, may not be able to or may not desire to go to college". Interestingly, Edward directed that the committee that administers the trust shall be "a Catholic Priest, and Episcopal priest, and a Protestant minister". So, Edward willed an ecumenical partnership!

According the Trust's by-laws, as administrators we are tasked with providing \$500 to \$3,000 scholarships "to students demonstrating motivation, self-reliance, learning aptitude and personal initiative and who are making a demonstrable financial commitment to their own education".

In February in our church chapel, I had the great honor to marry Kaitlin Haskins to her husband (Sid). Kaitlin is a nursing student at Vermont Technical College (VCT) in Brattleboro. At the wedding, I befriended one of Kailin's friends, Kadidjatou (Kadi) Diallo, who also attends VCT. I found both young women to be greatly admired. Kaitlin and Sid have attended our worship services before and after their wedding. Kadi has with me attended 'Black Lives Matters' rallies in Brattleboro and has recently been present in our on-line worship.

Kaitlin is from Michigan where her parents currently live. Previously, she earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Arts Administration and Music from Butler University in Indianapolis, Indiana. Kadi is from West Africa having lived in Abidjan, Cote d'Ivoire; Paris, France; Gatineau, Canada; and Burlington, VT. Kadi has family residing in West Africa, France, and Canada. Yet despite her young age, she is strong, independent, and 'flying solo' in the USA!

Upon my, and thus Centre Church's recommendation, both women received in June \$3,000 each to contribute to their on-going studies (Registered Nurse) at VCT in the fall. Both students have as part of their vocational training worked at the Thompson House here in Brattleboro.

I believe that in this still patriarchal and racist country, it is crucial that the church support and invest in capable, intelligent, and gifted young women, particularly those of color. By administrating this Trust with Father Baker and Rev. Lindquist, I am, with Centre Church, living-out our promise to 'Be the Church'.

May Edward Lyon inspire all of us to also leave legacies of affirmation and support to those who most need and deserve it – even long after we have passed from this world.

MISSION & SERVICE

Mission & Service (M&S) continues to focus on what the needs of our community at home and at large we can continue to serve through our Second Sunday Offerings and through local service. July's Second Sunday offering supported the *PINS* program through Department of Children and Families (DCF). On August 11, the Second Sunday offering will be for Brattleboro Senior Meals, which encompasses the lunches served (for takeout currently) at the Senior Center and *Meals on Wheels* delivered to seniors at home. Since the Corona virus has changed so much and more seniors are going out less, many, many more meals are being delivered to individual homes. These meals are a very important service to the seniors in our community, especially those on limited incomes. Federal and state funding for such services has been tighter recently, leading to even more need for community support.

Loaves & Fishes continues to link Centre Church and St Michaels Episcopal Church to those most vulnerable in our community by providing meals to Groundworks Collaborative and Foodworks.). Over 400 meals are prepared and delivered weekly from our kitchen to the Quality Inn and the old Domino's Pizza location on Canal Street. With Ruth Tilghman at the helm and a very dedicated crew of cooks, bakers, onion cutters, food deliverers, food receivers, dish washers and floor moppers, Memorial Hall, the coolbot, store rooms, and the KITCHEN are busy places to be on Monday for deliveries and Tuesday/Friday for meal prep and dispersal. In other business in July, M&S made small contributions to UCC's ONA Coalition and to Inanda Seminary. The *ONA Coalition* has been an important support both to our church and many churches across the country as they have moved through the ONA (Open and Affirming) process. We feel that a letter of support and a nominal donation is important as they struggle financially and face layoffs. Inanda Seminary/School also is facing financial struggles and again, we felt that a nominal donation of support in The Rev Scott Couper's name was appropriate. Centre Church is also struggling financially during this unusual time. We ask that members of our congregation remember that our tithing and financial support of our church helps support so many others through these above mentioned missions and services. PLEASE remember to support Centre Church and all that it is, ALL that WE ARE!

Under discussion at M&S, Brattleboro Gallery Walk is exploring ways it can present a gallery tour of Brattleboro virtually. Centre Church has been part of this planning pre-COVID. M&S is looking at how and what we might present through Gallery Walk. Stay tuned.

Also discussed was how we at Centre Church might help to organize masks for children, as many school age children will need to where masks for school. If you would like to be part of this discussion, let us know.

One last note: Emelio's youngest son, Jermall, arrived in July. The paperwork has been submitted for both sons' immigration. The hope is that they will be able to stay permanently in Brattleboro. Our prayers go out to Emelio and his family along with prayers of thanksgiving as they settle into their new home.

On July 3, our church concluded a three-part Forum on Racism entitled "Letting Our Faith Guide Us toward Anti-Racism". Members explored history, police brutality, systemic racism, and white supremacy on three successive Fridays via ZOOM. The first showing was homiletic, a sermon entitled "The Cross and the Lynching Tree: A Requiem for Ahmaud Arbery" by The Rev Dr Otis Moss III (minister of Trinity Church, UCC in Chicago, IL). This extremely densely packed and eloquent sermon is a tour de force. The historical and theological sentiments conveyed about race and justice are brilliant and inspiring. The second showing was that of popular entertainer, Trevor Noah from South Africa and host of *The Daily Show*. Trevor treated us to a long thoughtful and personal monologue about race, protests, social contracts, and COVID-19 that places our current national division in context. Our third and last showing was the documentary "13th" that examined the issue of mass incarceration of Black Americans since the Reconstruction Era immediately following the Civil War. Abi Healey led the group in a very professional and competent manner. The usually taciturn Erick Strickland was very insightful and provocative. Lynn Herzog, Karen Rydant, Dennis Newman, and others with the ministers were encouraged to be introspective and transparent about their own implicit bias and white privilege. Roger Brown thankfully assisted by hosting our meetings on ZOOM. The group wishes to continue discussion via a more in-depth UCC curriculum based program ("Sacred Conversations to End Racism" or "Let's Talk"). See July 16 eNews.

No se habla Espanol [A story from the archives]

The last week end of this past June Marion and Peter Abell planned to be out of town. They called on the Member Care Department to ask for people to come and visit Samuel and Antonia Rodriguez while they were gone. Most of you reading this know that mother and son, from El Salvador, have been living with the Abell's while in the U.S. for extensive corrective surgery for Samuel.

I was happy to be of help and called Dee and Bob Keller to stop by and visit on Friday afternoon and Monday morning. Judi and Roger Miller offered to take the Rodriquez's to church on Sunday. I thought perhaps I could drive in from Putney and take them to Farmer's Market on Saturday. Since I speak no Spanish, Peter suggested that I arrive at their home late Sat morning, when someone would be there who was conversant in Spanish and could explain to Samuel and Antonia where I wanted to take them. I would do that.

But when I arrived at 11:00am Samuel got across to me that the Spanish speaking person would not be there until 4:00pm (*quarto*). I was stumped! How to say to them, "Would you like to go with me to Farmers' Market and get lunch?" My sign language didn't work. Antonia gave me the Spanish - English dictionary and I fumbled through pages looking for words. Any high school Spanish I learned 50 years ago at West Side High School Newark, NJ fled my mind completely.

"Well, Lord, I wondered/prayed. "What do I do now? How can I communicate with them?"

Somehow through pantomime I got across the idea that we would go for a ride in my car. After we arrived at Farmers' Market we strolled around the outside perimeter surveying the delicious looking array of food for sale. We made our choices and found a table at which to sit.

And who should be sitting at that table but a mother with her young daughter eating berry pie. That woman spent several years in Ecuador when she was growing up! She understood and spoke Spanish and translated for us.


While we were talking up strolled Nina and John Trumper. John learned Spanish as a young Peace Corps Volunteer in the Dominican Republic . Another translator! They had decided to visit the market that morning me on a whim, Nina later told me.

Samuel spotted Dee and Bob Keller, shopping at a vegetable booth. He walked to meet them on his newly repaired legs and brought them to our table. We spent the rest of the time there eating Greek and Italian food while carrying on our conversations in Spanish and English with help from John and the lady with the berry pie.

Nina C. Trumper died Thursday July 9, 2020 at Mid Coast Hospital, Brunswick, Maine.

She was born Nina Mary Tucker in 1932 in Dorchester, Mass., the second of 5 children of Canadian parents. They moved to Merrimack, NH, where she attended schools and then finished training as an RN at Keene Hospital School of Nursing in 1953.

She married Charles Cathcart in 1954; they had 3 children: Karen Lynch of Jonesboro, Arkansas, "Chip" Cathcart of Portland, Maine, and Lynne Avery of Concord, NH, all of whom survive, along with 8 grandchildren. She is also survived by her present husband John, sister Jackie of Topsham, and brother, Bruce, of Alexandria, NH.

Her 1st marriage ended in 1978. She married John Trumper, a Pediatrician, whom she met at work in Brattleboro Hospital. They practiced together after she trained as a Nurse Practitioner in 1970 (the first one to be licensed in Vermont). While employed in that role she acquired her BSN degree at Keene State College and, later, MSN at Univ. of Massachusetts.

Nina and John worked a sabbatical year on the Turtle Mountain Chippewa Indian Reservation in North Dakota in 1982. In 1992 she shifted to Public Health to work as an NP for the Vermont Health Dept. until retirement in 1998.

After a visit to the former Soviet Union in 1990, Nina initiated a medical exchange between Vermont and Petrozavodsk, a city in Russia near Finland, which continued annually for the next 5 years. After retirement, Nina & John lived in Tennessee, South Dakota, New Zealand, and Newfoundland, for several months each year while John worked in hospitals there.

They moved to a community in Topsham, Maine in 2011 where they were living when she died of long term complications of Alzheimer's Dementia.

Nina was very energetic physically, socially, intellectually, even outside of her professional role and rarely sat still for long. She enjoyed the outdoors: gardening, walking everywhere, hiking in the White Mountains, she was on the national ski patrol, she quilted and knitted for many years. She loved classical music, played the piano, sang in the Brattleboro Centre Congregational Church choir where she was a member for 40 years, and in several other choral groups. She especially enjoyed dancing. She was an avid reader & founded a women's book group in Brattleboro which still exists.

She immersed thoroughly in the communities wherever she lived or worked and made many good friends from New Zealand to Newfoundland, in Vermont, Maine & in between. Her patients, and all of us, will miss her greatly & remember her fondly.


CENTRE CHURCH LEADERSHIP


The ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL PROGRAM MEETING
