MINISTER'S COLUMN, Scott Couper

Dear Friends in Christ,

In mid-February, we will celebrate **Valentine's Day**. Valentine's Day can be considered to focus on 'Love'. Yet, I feel Valentine's Day more specifically focuses on the means by which we *communicate* love (flowers, cards, chocolates, jewelry, etc...).

This year, I hope to focus on how our church *communicates* its love for God, our community, the world, and all of Creation.

Christianity is is a powerful and deeply meaningful faith tradition because it is able to *communicate* the love of God and the love we should have for one another to even a selfish and hard-headed meathead like me. The genius of Christianity is not so much its emphasis on Love, but on the persuasive means by which it *communicates* Love.

Last month, the Christmas season concluded whereby God's love for the world was communicated with **Emmanuel** (God with Us): Jesus the Christ.

Forthcoming, during Holy Week, we will focus our gaze on the **Cross** that again communicates God's solidarity with us – even through, or *especially* through, our pain and suffering.

And during Easter, when we celebrate the **Resurrection** of Jesus Christ, we are proclaiming the fulfillment of a promise that God never abandons us, not even, in death.

The Nativity, the Cross, and the Resurrection are means by which to communicate God's love.

As a church, we are called to continually discern means by which to best *communicate* God's love. Crassly put, that is 'marketing'. Marketing, at its essence, is communication. Yet, our faith is not commercial – love is not a commodity to be bought and sold through transaction. So, Christians use the word 'evangelism', a faith-based term for 'marketing'. The word *evangelize* comes from the Church Latin *evangelizare*, 'to spread or preach the Gospel', with the Greek root *evangelizesthai*, or 'bring good news'.

Last month, we celebrated the New Year. It is 2023. How do we evangelize *today*? How do we communicate God's love to a world that desperately yearns to know of it? How do we, like Hallmark, during this month we celebrate Valentines Day, most effectively and efficiently communicate our faith? The traditional methods have been music, yes, pastoral care, yes, feeding the hungry through Loaves & Fishes, yes, caring for 'the little ones' through Brattleboro Centre for Children and Faith in Action, yes. These methods are still very much effective and should be continued.

Yet, in 2023 we also need to employ modernity in how we communicate the gospel: social media, hybrid worship, contemporary Christian music, and on-line giving. Centre Church will soon discern new methods of 'being church' in our community through our future partnership with the **Sacred Places** initiative. Innovation is not a threat. Innovation is a means by which to better *communicate* that which

is ancient, traditional, and tried and true. Let's continue to communicate the gospel – God's love for the world – by 'old' and 'new' ways.

It looks as though we will end the year with a small surplus, rather than the huge deficit we had predicted. A combination of many small savings and a few large donations brought about this miracle. Let us all offer a prayer of thanks!

Looking back on 2022, many good things have happened in the church. We have come through the pandemic pretty well.

Attendance at Sunday worship is slowly increasing, and we have a new on-line congregation, thanks to the pandemic.

- People are very happy to get together at our new Hospitality Time, especially when it includes food and singing (a great new addition!).
- Our refugee team worked with the West Brattleboro and Dummerston churches to welcome our Afghan family and help them adjust to life in the US.
- Our church offered space for Muslims to worship (and we will now have Zen Buddhists renting a room from us, too – making us quite an inter-faith center).
- We yielded our basement to the good work of Loaves & Fishes and Carry Me Home.
- And the Green@Center is now putting on wonderful entertainments once a month, with an art show that lasts all month.

This year also saw the conclusion of the work of the Long-Range Planning Team. These hardworking, thoughtful, and creative people have given us a new vision of a church that is believing and becoming all that God intends. Now it is up to us to bring about that vision.

The choir is now rehearsing back in the Music Room as of mid-January! The last time we rehearsed there was in March, 2020 when we had to abruptly stop practicing and were sent home. That was when everything shut down because of the pandemic. When we returned to in-person services last year, we rehearsed in the sanctuary as it was a larger space and felt safer. I was planning on going back to the Music Room this past fall, but the electric piano died. We explored having it repaired...it was even taken apart, but Technics is no longer in business and therefore parts aren't available nor is anyone fixing that brand. Thanks to Ron Svec and Peter Abell, the well-used keyboard was brought to the dump. After a few months of searching for a replacement, I found a second-hand Roland Digital Piano that was gently used. Jenifer Ambler and I loaded it in my truck, carried it up the stairs and it is now resting comfortably in the Music Room. Digital pianos do not require tuning so we save \$130 a year (or twice a year) by going this route. We have already used it for rehearsals. Roland Digitals are an excellent brand and the one we purchased retails for \$2,000. We were able to purchase it for \$950 even though the asking price was \$1,200. The woman from whom we purchased it lowered the price because it was going to a church! This was an unexpected purchase and it wasn't in the budget. If anyone feels moved to help cover this expense, please feel free to make a check out to Centre Congregational Church and indicate 'piano fund' in the memo section. Any amount would be helpful. I will start the ball rolling with a \$100 contribution.

Thanks go to Alison Hale for her beautiful flute playing on Martin Luther King Sunday. We played several Spirituals arranged by Mark Hayes for the Prelude and Postlude. It is always such a gift to hear Alison's exquisite playing!

AFGHAN CO-SPONSORSHIP TEAM

Over the past year, I had the privilege of serving on an Afghanistan refugee co-sponsorship team composed mostly of members of three local United Church of Christ congregations. Our family consisted of two parents and, until a recent joyful addition, three children. There were countless ways that our community inspired us with the welcome they extended to the family. I want to speak specifically about the area I helped facilitate - education.

Our family's children were warmly welcomed by school representatives from the outset, and they and their parents were treated with compassion and dignity. The English Language Learners (ELL) teachers were the first and most constant connections between the family and the schools. From the initial encounter, an intake interview, I was struck by the high degree of preparation and care these teachers showed. Deb Coombs, Jen Course, and Rachel Scarano were remarkably ready for the large influx of ELL students created by our community's resettlement of refugees. Despite the stress this must have caused them, they were calm, gentle and reassuring as they discussed the previous educational background of the children, what the process was for enrolling them at Academy School and Brattleboro Area Middle School, and what their experience would be like as they began attending. Once the students started going to school, the sense of a warm embrace was extended by the entire school population, from the classroom teachers who welcomed and fully included each child in instruction as well as their classroom communities, to the students who reached out and befriended them and created room signs in Dari or Pashto languages, to the administrators who extended offers of support and created spaces for the children to privately observe their noontime prayers, to the coordinators of after school programs who eagerly included the children into their activities. But the anchor of support, educationally, culturally, and personally for the children remained to be their ELL teachers. Jen, Deb, and Rachel as well as Olivia Clark and Heidi Pancake established strong, healthy, positive relationships with the children, helping them to understand academic content in a new language, and creating a space in which they felt comfortable and known. The children loved their schools and looked forward to attending every day.

The family we welcomed to Brattleboro last February has recently relocated to another part of the country where the father has found a good job in his professional field. As our work with them concludes, our team felt it was important to shine a positive light on the outstanding experience this family of refugees had in our schools.




A word of good cheer would be warmly received by members and friends of our church who are in nursing homes, assisted living centers, or are housebound as of November 26.
