MINISTER'S COLUMN, Scott Couper

Dear Friends in Christ,

On **Wednesday, June 7**, from 3:00pm to 6:00pm, Centre Church will host the 'Who's Who' of leaders in Brattleboro to an **'asset-mapping event'**. I ask for your prayers leading towards this special day. As much as we have 'planned' for this special day, it is a day in which we desire the **Holy Spirit** to intervene.

A year after I began my ministry at Centre Church, we began with the Vermont Conference's financial assistance a Vitality Coaching initiative that lasted approximately one year. This coaching began of what has come to be four years of **long-range** planning. The leadership of our church attended numerous workshops, received weekly vitality newsletters, and was a part of a broader collective of churches that sought to implement 'best practices' for local churches in an era of secularization and modernity whereby the Christian church no longer has numerical, governmental, nor societal privilege. In addition, the church seeks a means by which to proclaim the gospel in a community and nation that is characterized by the breakdown of the nuclear and extended family and hyper-personal mobility. Paul Nickerson mentored us as a coach.

About the time of the COVID pandemic began, we began the second phase of our long-range planning: **consultancy**. Rather than collective coaching, we hired Paul Nickerson to be our church's consultant. Paul helped our church identify its strengths and weaknesses and led us through the long journey, lasting almost two years, of defining our church's vision and mission. Under Bob Pu and April Harkness' capable leadership, we discerned well! Yet, the identification of our church's vision and mission was primarily macro and aspirational. We needed to take the next step after deciding to be a church that fostered 'belonging, believing, and becoming'.

The third and last step, lasting about a year, has been our work with **Partners for Sacred Places**. The Sacred Places initiative relates specifically to the capacity of the church to carry-out its vision and mission. Our church has diminishing human and financial resources to carry-out *any* vision or mis-



sion. Our partnership with the Sacred Places is a resurrection of a previous one that began and ended (2014) without substantive result (accessibility) before I became the minister. The Sacred Places initiative enables our church to assess our physical building and campus and the community's needs and priorities. Sacred Places seeks to partner the church with the community so that cooperative efforts will enable our historical and iconic 'space' on Main Street to be a relevant and vital presence in Brattleboro and for our church to continue to proclaim the Christian message to a world that desperately needs it.

On **Wednesday, June 7**, local government, health agencies, social welfare organizations, the arts community, and other faith traditions will tour our building and campus, engage in a plenary forum, and enjoy food and drinks. We pray that there will be a meeting of minds and hearts. We pray the intervention of the Holy Spirit will foster, through collaborative relationships, fruitful brainstorming and discernment leading to a catalyzation of an exciting mission-focused way forward for our church and community. We pray this event will enable our church to continue to be the 'Jewell on Main Street'. Please pray for our special day, the culmination of our four-year long-range planning journey.



Please support **Windham World Affairs Council** and our minister, Scott Couper, by attending a lecture by his uncle, **Dr. Jack Jewell** and partner, **Tina Boniface**, on **Thursday**, **June 22**, 6:30pm at 118 Elliot St.

Jack and Tina will present on:

Antarctica: Axis of Ocean Currents, Climate, and Exploration

Jack Jewell is a mostly-retired scientist and entrepreneur. In a quest to develop computer logic devices based on optics instead of electronics in the 1980s at Bell Laboratories, he spearheaded a collaboration that demonstrated over one million lasers on a chip smaller than a pinky-nail. That ignited the field of vertical-cavity surfaceemitting lasers (VCSELs), which are used in highspeed communications within data centers and supercomputers, laser mice, facial recognition and lidar in smartphones, and handheld atomic clocks. Frustrated by his company's lack of interest in develop VCSELs, he started two companies to do such. Jewell has 79 issued U.S. patents. In college, Jewell studied Physics, Astronomy, and Optics, receiving a Ph.D. in Optical Sciences from the University of Arizona in 1984.

The presentation will have mostly photos, but also videos from multiple sources about climate change (as the expedition measured ice-melting acceleration), wildlife, international relations, and a 'travelogue' with a special human interest story about a rescue at sea involving a Ukrainian and a Russian surgeon.

FREEDOM TO SLAVES!

Whereas, the President of the United States did, on the first day of the present month, issue his Proclamation declaring "that all persons held as Slaves in certain designated States, and parts of States, are, and henceforward shall be free," and that the Executive Government of the United States, including the Military and Naval authorities thereof, would recognize and maintain the freedom of said persons. And Whereas, the county of Frederick is included in the territory designated by the Proclamation of the President, in which the Slaves should become free, I therefore hereby notify the citizens of the city of Winchester, and of said County, of said Proclamation, and of my intention to maintain and enforce the same.

I expect all citizens to yield a ready compliance with the Proclamation of the Chief Executive, and I admonish all persons disposed to resist its peaceful enforcement, that upon manifesting such disposition by acts, they will be regarded as rebels in arms against the lawful authority of the Federal Government and dealt with accordingly.

All persons liberated by said Proclamation are admonished to abstain from all violence, and immediately betake themselves to useful occupations.

The officers of this command are admonished and ordered to act in accordance with said proclamation and to yield their ready co-operation in its enforcement.


