In the last Centre Bells edition, Rev Scott described your recent analysis and recommendations for the future of the church. It was an exciting, hopeful exploration of all which is here and possible for the church.

Now, just one month later, Scott is making a different exploration, described beautifully in these pages....journeying to the far reaches of your ministry and its impact in the small community of Cabanitas, El Salvador.

For each of these explorations the same question, brought to Elijah in 1 Kings, might be asked: "What are you doing here?" Elijah kept poking his head in and out of the cave-- and each time he would appear he heard the same question, drawing him into the heart of his faith and his life's purpose. Similarly, Scott has led you to look at the very space you have supported for centuries and it purpose and its role in the Brattleboro community.

This past month, even just since I arrived to fill in, extremes of weather (wind, water, earthquakes and fire) have also drawn these same questions out of us and to the heart of our faith:

"What are we doing here??"

We can't help look at the earth and its extreme events, its peoples and their tumult, only to consider what we, in our small Vermont lives, can do. Joanna Macy, a mystic and environmental warrior, has worked for years encouraging "we, who despair for the earth and its peoples" to use that cave of despair and the questions which proceed from it as the grounding for our work together in the world.

In September this same despair and our love for the planet will frame our worship services.

If you are interested you can join online on September 1 and October 4 with people around the world at opening and closing services for the Annual Season of Creation. We will send the links to you in our September eNewsletters.

This year's theme is the "Mighty River", perfect for a church which sits poised on the bank of the Connecticut, the celebration hitting close to home, with all the floods and fears, the freedom and festivities rivers bring to us. I hope you can join in the beautiful music Mary has found for us and help me with prayers and poetry to lift up all our love for the earth and our hopes for things to come.




BRATTLEBORO CENTRE FOR CHILDREN

SCOTT'S EL SALVADOR ADVENTURE

Pretty much everyone is aware that Pastor Scott Couper is spending August, the first month of his sabbatical in El Salvador. But some may not be aware of the background of our Sister Parish relationship there and his reasons for going.

Back in 1992, shortly after the peace accords were signed ending the long Salvadoran civil war, Peter Abell and his son Kim traveled there with a Vermont delegation on an educational tour. Then-pastor Jack Bixby had visited there previously. The group were very impressed with the determination of the Salvadorans to rebuild their lives and country. Conversations at church and Rotary meetings grew into a group of Brattleboro and Vermont medical personnel traveling to do clinics in 1994. Centre Church started the process of considering a Sister Parish relationship, inspired by Bethany UCC in Montpelier. Meanwhile mid-90s Associate Pastor Jo Shelnutt-Melendy had already adopted one child from El Salvador and was in the process of adopting another. It all seemed like destiny!

We formalized the Sister Parish relationship in 1996 and visited the Cabanitas community for the first time in 1997 and many times since for both clinics and church activities. We wanted to find a long-term sustainable way of helping them, instead of just week-long projects, and the conversations kept returning to education as the best way out of poverty. So we started the Luz del Mundo Scholarship Fund and have been helping the children of the Cristo Redentor Lutheran Church ever since.

After COVID-related postponements, the tri-annual Sister Parish Encuentro finally resumed in November 2022; this is a meeting in El Salvador to which representatives of all sister parish communities are invited. So newcomer Scott Couper joined longtime El Salvador veteran Jenifer Ambler to attend. He was very impressed with the energy and spirituality of the people in the Salvadoran Lutheran Church and in the Sister Parish program it administers. He said at that time that he wanted to devote part of his sabbatical to spending more time in El Salvador!

Scott is spending most of his time in El Salvador staying at a beautiful hilltop guest house in a safe neighborhood of San Salvador owned and operated by Christian Chaverria, a Lutheran Pastor very active in the Salvadoran Lutheran Synod. He has already worshiped at the main Lutheran Church, La Resurreccion, in the city, and has met with Pastor Francisco Aguilar of our sister church Cristo Redentor a couple of times. Plans are afoot to worship with Cristo Redentor a couple of Sundays, meet scholarship recipients, discuss more deeply the local community's conditions, needs and desires, and work out ways for us to continue supporting them as effectively as possible.

Meanwhile, as of press time, Scott has been finding the good safe places to indulge his love for running, visited a beautiful park near the guest house, visited the top of the volcano overlooking the city, and has many more sightseeing and history-learning plans saved up for the week his son Micah will be visiting with him.


