MINISTER'S COLUMN, Scott Couper

New Year - New Ideas

My sabbatical last year was a time of rest, renewal, and rejuvenation. And for what was the time needed?...for our church's possible big pivot after four years of discernment and planning to be a church of "believing, belonging, and becoming".

First, this New Year, we will have a new Administrator: **Mark Baxter**. Mark served on our Mission & Service Board last year. Mark has also welcomed our church and helped introduce the themes of our services each week. Mark has a great deal of experience in the corporate world, specifically in the field of marketing and has also served a church administrator in Danbury, Connecticut. On Sunday, December 31, we bid farewell to **Bruce Landenberger** who served our church faithfully for many years. I have come to depend on Bruce's diligence and competence and thus his departure leaves a wound for me.

Second, with an new Administrator we will have the opportunity to re-envision the position as a whole. Perhaps the position can expand from church administration to also include social media and facility's management (and thus move from part-time to a full-time position) as we continue to implement the work of Partners for **Sacred Places**.

Third, with a evolving Administrator position, it becomes possible to re-envision and downsize our church's **organizational structure**. Currently, our church directory lists SIXTEEN (16) boards, committees, teams, and ministries for our relatively small church of approximately one-hundred (100) members. We should consolidate, if only because we lack the human resources. More importantly, in the postmodern ecclesiastical era no new friends or guests of our church wish to join a 'committee. We can perhaps have three fellowships that focus on our vision of 'believing, belonging, and becoming' and that primarily delegate tasks, roles, and activities rather than meetings, agendas, and minutes to worshippers.

Fourth, while continuing to implement of work of Partners for Sacred Places, Council discussed a proposal to begin a **Kirtan** ministry at our church. Kirtan literally means 'collective performance' and it is a call and response musical genre. Kirtan derives primarily from the Hindu tradition. Centre Church seeks to be a place of welcome and worship for the Muslim, Jewish, Zen and Theravada Buddhists, AA/NA (Higher Power) communities to worship. While always and forever remaining Christians, we wish our ministry to be one that hosts other communities who will seek and enjoy spirituality through Sound Baths, meditation, and other healing practices.

Fifth, in the New Year I envision that our church would better live-out its designations as an **Open & Affirming** congregation and as a **Just Peace** church. Our designations should be demonstrated in our (new) church structure, church budget, and our partnerships with others who share our values (Out in the Open and Action Corps).

Sixth, in the New Year let us explore the use of a **Centre Church app** (or cellphone platform) that would allow us to consolidate our monthly and weekly newsletters, our church calendar, announcements, reminders, online giving, minutes, attendance, sign-ups, images (Facebook), church directory, etc...

Seventh, in the New Year it would be great to resurrect the great work of Joanne Nichols and other previous church historians. Much beautiful work has been done documenting our church's past, all of which can serve devotionally as we live-out it's future. To begin, I have requested the enlistment of our friend **Julian Mutter** who during my sabbatical assisted me in the organization of the church archive. Each month in *Centre Bells*, I would like us to include a vignette about our church's past that will inspire us in the present. For example, in 1957 when our church reached its peak membership and attendance, the *Centre Bells* newsletter read: "Mrs. Fred Muller, our church Secretary, will be in the church office on a full-time basis beginning the first week of January. The hours will be 8:30am to 4:00pm Mondays through Fridays except on holidays. Telephone is Alpine 4-4730." Also, the minister, Robert Harding wrote, "When the New Year comes, memory calls back the words of Jonathan Edwards: 'Resolved: that every man live to the glory of God. Resolved Second: that whether others do this or not, I will'. Surely no better resolve for any of us as we face this year of grace and opportunity".

Time marches on into a New Year. As does Centre Church, I pray, faithfully. In addition to Jonathan Edwards, I am reminded this January of the prophet Isaiah who spoke on God's behalf proclaiming, "See, I am doing a new thing! (Isaiah 43:19).

At our last Council meeting of 2023, we looked at the past long enough to celebrate Bruce for all that he has done for the church over many years. And we are very grateful that Mark Baxter has stepped forward to take his place.

Looking to the future, there are two projects that I would like to see addressed in 2024. One has been proposed by the Asset-Planning Team, which is trying to carry out the recommendations of our consultants and the Asset-Mapping Event. (It currently consists of Marion Abell, April, Jenifer, and me.) The consultant strongly recommended that we make better use of our building, and to this end we would like to create the position of Facility's Manager, who would oversee repairs and rentals, improve publicity, and increase community awareness of what is going on in the church. Another project is a revision of the By-Laws. The By-Laws were written when we were a much larger church (most recent revision 2017), and calls for five boards, and five committees, and has three different categories of membership. Some of us feel the number of boards and committees should be reduced, in keeping with our reduced number of members.

We would like to have a meeting after worship some Sunday in January to discuss these projects. Please come with ideas and opinions, and join the task forces that will be working on these proposals. On the Council, and in the church, we have some differences of opinion, and we have even had some disputes. But when we all work together, good things happen. Please join us in working together for the future of our church.

Here is Amazon's description of *Grounded*: "The headlines are clear: religion is on the decline in America as many people leave behind traditional religious practices. Diana Butler Bass, leading commentator on religion, politics, and culture, follows up her acclaimed book Christianity After Religion by arguing that what appears to be a decline actually signals a major transformation in how people understand and experience God. The distant God of conventional religion has given way to a more intimate sense of the sacred that is with us in the world. This shift, from a vertical understanding of God to a God found on the horizons of nature and human community, is at the heart of a spiritual revolution that surrounds us - and that is challenging not only religious institutions but political and social ones as well.

Grounded explores this cultural turn as Bass unpacks how people are finding new spiritual ground by discovering and embracing God everywhere in the world around us — in the soil, the water, the sky, in our homes and neighborhoods, and in the global commons. Faith is no longer a matter of mountaintop experience or institutional practice; instead, people are connecting with God through the environment in which we live. Grounded guides readers through our contemporary spiritual habitat as it points out and pays attention to the ways in which people experience a God who animates creation and community.

Bass brings her understanding of the latest research and studies and her deep knowledge of history and theology to Grounded. She cites news, trends, data, and pop culture, weaves in spiritual texts and ancient traditions, and pulls it all together through stories of her own and others' spiritual journeys. Grounded observes and reports a radical change in the way many people understand God and how they practice faith. In doing so, Bass invites readers to join this emerging spiritual revolution, find a revitalized expression of faith, and change the world."

Essex Junction, VT – Florence "Fluff" Lois Yates Storey, 90, formerly of Brattleboro, and currently of Mansfield Place in Essex Junction, VT., died on November 20, 2023, in Essex Junction, VT, after a lingering illness.

Fluff was born on July 13, 1933, in Winthrop, MA, to Margaret (Bordeaux) and Donald Earl Yates. She attended elementary school in Bellows Falls, VT, and graduated from Bellows Falls High School in 1951. She graduated from Castleton State Teacher's College in 1955.

Fluff married Rodney Lee Storey, whom she met at Castleton, in her senior year of college in 1954. Their daughter Sue Carol Storey was born in Portsmouth, VA in 1956, where they were spending Rodney's last year in the Navy.

After living in Virginia and Williamstown, VT in the late 50s, Fluff and Rod moved to Brattleboro in 1960, where they both had teaching careers. She achieved her master's degree in teaching from the University of Massachusetts, and a second master's degree with combined graduate studies from the University of Vermont, Keene State, and Norwich University. Fluff taught for 35 of her 38 years at the Academy School in West Brattleboro, retiring in 1995.

Fluff was a member of Delta Kappa Gamma, Eastern Star, the American Association of University Women, the Legion Auxiliary, a charter member of the Emblem Club (ELKS), the VFW, the Eagles, the Women's Evening Club, the "West Bees" Home Dem Club, the Shriners, the Hospital Auxiliary, various teachers' organizations, and the Floral Arts and Garden Club all of Brattleboro, VT. She volunteered in Church at various events, knitted many prayer shawls, as well as other community needs. She has been surrounded with great friends and has felt very fortunate to have them.

She enjoyed crafts, travel (USA, Asia, Africa, Europe, the Caribbean, and the Mediterranean), theater, painting, music, plants, cats, and literature. She even organized an Opera appreciation group and was the keeper of the Opera DVDs and videos, which there were hundreds of. Fluff and her husband Rod once won the husband/wife golf club championship at the Brattleboro Country Club which they were members of for many years.

Fluff's daughter Sue, Sue's husband Tom Broido, and her beloved granddaughters Halle Broido and Galen Broido and Galen's partner Giacomo Zilli survive her. She is also survived by two brothers, Fred Yates and Ross Yates. She was predeceased by her husband Rod in 1988, and her siblings, Pauline Yates Brillant, and Donald Yates. Also, her special friend and companion Kasper Fulghum, whom she met on a senior's trip to Spain in 1996, sharing the best of the north and the south together, predeceased her in 2017.

Fluff wanted her lifelong friends, as well as her new friends from Williston Place in Williston, VT, to know how much they meant to her, and how much they all enriched her life. Her new friends were a pleasant surprise to her after her move from Brattleboro, they all helped each other navigate their new lives in a new community.


