INTERIM MINISTER'S COLUMN, Rev. Bert Marshall

Just wondering. Let's say that Jesus is really alive somewhere and tuned in to what's happening in our world and in our lives — as opposed to, well, like sitting on a far away heavenly throne, judging the quick and the dead and the deadheads and the not-so-quick, one after the other in deadening endless procession: you know, 'you're saved, you're not, you're saved, you're not', until (one would think) even the most divine of beings, impervious to human drudgery and folly though they may be, would become restless and desire some of the freedoms and advantages thought to be inherent in divinity, such as the ability to traverse the Universe at will, or sneak into the realm of human experience and wreck havoc inside the minds of logical positivists and religious fundamentalists — anything, anything at all, other than sitting in judgment, 24/7, over a pathetic multitude of ordinary Earth mortals, plodding before you like terrified insects, who just for starters were cast unawares into the murky mists of human existence, and were then expected not only to get into a good school, land a job, and buy a house and a car, but to also somehow comprehend the total incomprehensible meaning of all-there-is-to-know during the course of a fleeting lifespan, or else, or else be tossed unceremoniously (and with much wailing and gnashing of teeth) into the outer lake of fire reeking darkness smoldering trash heap, or some such place. I mean, is this an activity befitting the Christ the Son of God the Son of Man the Messiah Prince of Peace?

I don't think so. But let's say that Jesus is alive and listening in, which is what we say we believe (if you don't believe this, please report to the dungeon immediately). So I'm just wondering. If we say that Jesus is alive and paying attention to what's going on, then what might he have to say about the present state of affairs? What if he suddenly showed up somewhere in our world today? Shall we suppose he would appear in the mightiest wealthiest greatest most powerful high-tech nation with the most bombs in the whole world ever? Well, probably not, because unless he changed his whole message quite a bit, an awful lot of our folks wouldn't care to hear from him right now anyway. Better if he landed in, say, Gaza, or maybe Syria, or Haiti, or Afghanistan. This means, of course, that most of us wouldn't get to see him at all, which is exactly what happened the last time he appeared nearly two thousand years ago when he showed up as (gasp!) a tiny helpless infant in a small town in a small country ruled at the time by the mightiest wealthiest greatest most powerful high-tech empire with the most chariots and spears in the whole world ever.

But let's say that Jesus is alive and concerned about what's going on and is able to be everywhere all at once, like Santa Claus, so we could hear what he would say to us. Would he say that "love your enemies" was maybe a little too extreme and that he's changed his mind now and thinks that a little hate, a little bigotry, and some violent retaliation might work in some cases? Would he say that "pray for those who persecute you" is a seriously misguided teaching because (he realizes now) it gives aid and comfort to the enemies of the powerful? Perhaps he would say that "turn the other cheek" wasn't such a good idea after all because it only leads to rejection and suffering, while the benefits of Roman citizenship would have been so much nicer and ever so much safer, and might even have included a nice retirement package. Forgiveness? Well, he might say, it's certainly easier to forgive after you've soundly defeated your adversary, or at least captured and deported him. It must be tough to be Jesus these days, recognizing that most of your greatest teachings are apparently deemed irrelevant by a large majority of the people who use your name to name their faith.

Anyway, I was just wondering. Personally, I believe in Jesus' teachings - even the most difficult ones, even if I repeatedly fall flat trying to follow them – and I often do. I believe that his Way of compassion, nonviolence, and love is the way to the Realm of God. Friends, let us not grow weary of living the Gospel each

day, as best we can!


From Music Director, MARY MILKEY-MAY


