INTERIM MINISTER'S COLUMN, Rev. Bert Marshall

Resurrection Bread

The day of Easter passes quickly, it seems. After forty long days of Lent, the final push through Holy Week, the ritual remembering of Jesus' suffering and death – the long march explodes into a bright flash of pageantry and then fades abruptly into a strange and silent landscape of vague, shifting forms that move swiftly away as we turn toward the next items on society's agenda. Over there, an empty tomb appears. Behind it, a hill with a hundred wooden crosses. Buzzards, dry bones, blood. Shadows from a distant past. Shattered bodies and broken dreams.

If you followed Jesus of Nazareth to that hill, your dreams are really broken now. Your dreams are broken and your heart is pounding with fear and your head is aching with the pain of failure and disillusionment. You're angry, too. You're angry because you were dumb enough to follow this loser, and now you're a loser, too. And other people saw you following him around with that idiotic grin on your face for three years, and they also think you're a loser. Big time.

Isn't this great? This is just great. Then some of the women come running back from the tomb. They're out of breath. They can hardly speak. They say it's empty. You say 'What's empty?' They say 'it's empty, it's empty. The tomb! The body's gone. He's not there. Come on, we'll show you!'

But you didn't go. Neither did most of your friends. In fact, hardly anyone went. Why didn't everyone jump up and go – all the disciples, the Twelve, the whole gang? You don't know. It's hard to get up off the floor when your dreams are broken in pieces and you're aching with pain and fear. It's hard to walk out the door when you think you're a loser and all your hopes have just been crushed under a Roman boot heel. Forget the alleluias. You've got enough to worry about. You've got problems of your own to deal with. You gotta look out for yourself. The authorities are probably looking for you now, too.

The Easter pageant passes quickly, it seems. Especially for those who think they have no need for resurrection. Especially for those who are quite sure there must be a logical explanation for all this (the body was stolen or hidden; he didn't actually die; the women went to the wrong one; the whole story was made up; etc.). Easter has become, by and large, a cultural event of a rather dim magnitude. Perhaps this is unavoidable, and even acceptable, or possibly even good.

Resurrection, however, is something else; something entirely different. It is God's ability to bring life directly out of death. Anywhere, any day. It is the presence of Christ in our neighbors and in ourselves. Right now. A noticeable, detectable presence. This presence is especially powerful wherever there are broken dreams, broken hearts, and losers. Those are the people who first saw and understood why the tomb was empty, even if they couldn't all describe what had happened, even though their descriptions were not the same. Something happened that overwhelmed them, changed them, transformed them, empowered them. Rescued by resurrection, they began to practice resurrection.

We observe a holiday, and then life returns to normal. The early disciples – Jesus' motley band of followers – experienced a miracle, and their lives were never the same again. And while we cannot expect to re-create and re-enact a miracle every year on command at Easter, we can be more alert for Christ's appearances in our midst. Resurrection is all around us. The bright flash of pageantry we experience on Easter Day should be the beginning of a journey each year: a journey of discovery and hope in which the risen Christ does, indeed, appear in our midst. You only need to see through the masks and disguises. You only need to remove the barriers in your own life that prevent you from seeing.

The Easter pageant passes quickly, it seems. But resurrection sticks to you like glue. It follows you everywhere. You can't shake it loose. It's in those shadowy perceptions at the edge of your vision. It's in every broken heart, every broken dream, every idiotic grin, every lost soul – every place where hopelessness dwells, every land where oppression and fear reign, every street where injustice holds sway. It's in the breaking of bread, the sharing of a cup. Look around in the coming weeks. You can see it if you try. Presence. The shattering of reality. Life out of death.

Christ is risen, indeed! Alleluia!

Stop and take a look.




GLORIA VICENTE WILL BE WITH US APRIL 23 & 24

Our Missionary Relationship began with Gloria in 2007 when she went to Guatemala to serve as an advisor and support person with the Guatemalan Cultural Action organization. She worked with women in the micro loan and savings project including teaching alternative and cost effective ways of cooking meals.

Gloria was born in Guatemala in 1975 but her family moved to the U.S. when she was five years old because her grandparents and other family members were killed in the terrible civil wars at that time. She grew up in Chicago where her family was accepted as refugees. When she finished college she worked for six years with organizations helping Latin American workers and communities in the Chicago area. Then, in 2007 she felt called to return to Guatemala to serve those in need. She said:, "Coming from a family who survived a civil war and a father who has believed in justice, peace and human rights has inspired me... to follow Jesus Christ's life and teachings of compassion and love of one's neighbors..."

During the eight years of our Centre Church relationship with Gloria, members of our Mission and Service Committee have learned about her continuing service in Guatemala and shared that with our congregation. Marty Fenn's sister, Rev. Sue Bowman, met with Gloria in 2007 at a church conference and later Joanna Reuter, on her way to El Salvador, stopped in Guatemala to spend some time with Gloria and her husband, Santos. Through the years as Gloria's family grew to include 3 children, Joanna has provided pictures of them which have been posted on our Mission & Service bulletin board. Some years ago Jeanne Reuter organized a project to send Christmas gifts to Gloria's children and our congregation also sent the family a Prayer Shawl.

Gloria's family has now returned home to Chicago and Gloria has been traveling to many churches in different states to report about her important work in Guatemala with Global Ministries. We look forward to her being with us on Saturday, April 23 when we are all invited to share a brunch with her and on Sunday, April 24 for our worship service together.
