#### SERRV and El Salvador Crafts Sales!



### Church World Service Blanket Sales


Mission & Service will be selling CWS blankets during December coffee hours. \$5 "buys" a blanket to be sent to disaster areas throughout the world for



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

## **Grand Finale**

When I first learned of the plans for Sunday, October 28 this year my initial reaction was "Oh no!—how are we going to get that all crammed into one day? an historical worship service 1816 style, the celebration of Silver Bells Society, a luncheon using 18th century recipes, — costumes,—picture taking and then a lecture on historical church meeting house architecture.

It happened—and it was a wonderful wrap up, the grand finale of our year of bicentennial celebrations.

Most of the choir and many in the congregation got in the spirit and wore period costumes. The choir sang old-fashioned songs. Pastor Bert preached from the pulpit a sermon that Dot VanderMeulen had found in the church archives. It was written by one of the first ministers. Even though Bert cut the length of the sermon in half it was long! I wondered how those early Congregationalists sat through an hour-long sermon. In the book "This Jewel on Main Street," Heidi Mario's cartoon on page 27 shows



a family sitting through a sermon in the cold of winter. I wondered if they sang all the verses of all the hymns in those days, or did they speed things up by singing just the first and last?

The Silver Bells celebration hap-

pened with the children handing out the carnations to all the members as their years were called. The newest inductees are Jenifer Ambler and Dawn Everett Grobe.

As we exited Darrel Daley snapped pictures of all the carnation-carrying members. These are currently on display on a couple of bulletin boards. Later they will be added to our growing collection of Silver Bells albums, going back to 1995.

Then it was down to Memorial Hall for the delicious potluck luncheon with dishes cooked from recipes of bygone years.

Many stayed for the illustrated lecture in the parlor. Jack Bixby introduced Dr Glenn Andres, who spoke on the architecture of New England meeting houses, with a special emphasis on this Centre Church. I left with a new appreciation of this beautiful historic building.



In the February issue of Centre Bells I wrote:

"This year of celebrating the church's 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary gives us a chance to take stock—to appreciate all the church has meant in the past, to celebrate its place on Main Street today and to think about who we are, what we need and what our goals are as we look ahead."

This Bicentennial Year 2016 has been a success because of all the creative ideas offered and carried out by so many members of the committee, co-chaired by Judy Palmer and Dart Everett. The congregation enthusiastically joined in the special events and invited others to join us.

A final note that the book "This Jewel on Main Street" would make a fine gift to give to people, especially those who used to have some connection with Brattleboro and this church.

### PEACE CANDLE COMMITTEE


In preparing for this Peace Candle moment, I reflected on *where* we have been and *where* we are going. *Who* we have been and *who* will we be in the future?

In 1837 we are the church who participated in antislavery discussions in our chapel.

And wider, we were formed as a church from leaders like Karl Berth and Ditrek VonHoffeur. Ditrek left Germany as WWll intensified, only to return to be of service to his country's people. He was executed there.

And in more recent history, we have struggled to find ways to connect and serve, as in 1988 when we declared Centre Church to be a *Just Peace Church*, connecting Justice and Peace in "all that we do." We joined with others world wide in the "Bridges for Peace" program and supported citizen exchanges. Don Webster, Judy Kinley and Mary Ellen Bixby traveled as citizens and CCC church members to Russia during the Cold War times. Ideas and understanding were opened up for us in these exchanges between Russia and the US, between Moscow and Brattleboro, between a Greek Orthodox church and Centre Congregational Church, and as one person to another.

And in 1992, our church began its support and understanding of El Salvador and Cabanitas, our sister parish. From their initial visits, church members Jack Bixby, Peter Abell, Jim Lobenstein, Dart Everett, Jenifer Ambler, and Marion



Abell have inspired us to be connected with this small country and its people. Rotary trips, medical trips and the creation of Pure Water for the World all stem from the support and hard work of these church and community members.

Our church continues its strong commitment of justice and peace through its support of education and our trips to El Salvador. The Luz del Mundo school scholarship program supports children from Cabanitas to further their education from elementary school through college. Our support of this program insures that children can attend school and progress to the next level of their education. Our last youth group trips in 2013 and 2014 connected our youth with many of these students from Cabanitas. They travelled, played, worked, shared meals and worshiped in their homes and their church, connecting teens to teens and adults to adults.

And today we continue our work for justice and peace by supporting the work of: Carry Me Home, the distribution of clothing from Centre Church basement to refugees of war in Syria; Loaves and Fishes, feeding not only the homeless but the changing faces of those in need in Brattleboro; and One Great Hour of Sharing, supporting needs around the world. Today we will send funds to Haiti to help the people of this small, poor country move forward after the devastating hurricane.

This is an incomplete list of all that Centre Church does in unity and as individuals. When our daughter Tori was preparing to go with the church to El Salvador, she received a note card that said, "Our lives may be the only Gospel some people ever read." We carry the Gospel with us through our lives and our actions.

As we celebrate our history and look forward today in contemplating and filling in our Search Committees surveys, let us reflect on Dot Vander Muelen's words in *This Jewel on Main Street,* "We honor those who have come before and made possible the church to which we belong. That said, we move on to grow and change as the world around us moves on. Conditions, needs, new knowledge and insights cause us to reevaluate our old ideas and traditions and we do change and grow as a result."

Mother Teresa said, "We may wonder whom can I love and serve? Where is the face of God to whom I can pray? The answer is simple. That naked one. That lonely one. That unwanted one is my brother and my sister. If we have no peace it is because we have forgotten that we belong to each other."

Lord, help us to work to connect to one another through you, through an active Peace. Amen


# Everyone is invited to the *MOMENT for PEACE*

As we enter this season of Advent, we hope to provide you with inspiring music. This year, however,



### **Imagine A World**


Imagine a world in which there is one dominant power. The symbols of its power are omnipresent: troops deployed in far-flung regions, emissaries stationed around the world, all economic and political relationships geared to serve its every whim, opposition and dissent controlled by threats of violence and war. Imagine a world in which people are crushed by this imperial system, impoverished and humiliated, denied the basic essentials of life, forced to struggle every day for sustenance and dignity. Imagine a world in which people live out their entire lives as permanent victims of a world order dedicated to their deprivation and suffering. Imagine a world in which those who are victimized by such a system spend their days seething with anger and resentment at the injustice of their existence, seeking at every turn the means to overthrow the imperial powers and to liberate themselves and their people.

Jesus was born into such a world.

Imagine a world where people dream of happiness and prosperity, where fairness and justice are deemed worthy of one's aspirations, where peace and nonviolence are sought after and yearned for. Imagine a world in which people long to work for a decent income, to live comfortably, to raise families in safe communities. Imagine a world in which those hopes and dreams are routinely thwarted and demolished by a system that prefers to honor disproportionate wealth and privilege, the violence of unfettered competition, the glorification of power and victory. Imagine a world in which civil liberties are contingent upon the color of your skin, or your religious beliefs, or your gender, or the place where you were born.

Jesus was born into such a world.

We've come around again to Advent, the time of watching and waiting for the light of God coming into our midst (*Emmanu-El: 'God-with-us'*). We have come full-circle through the seasons of the year and now we stand again at the threshold of an ancient mystery. The beloved image of the Christ-child in a manger of straw begins to form at the edges of our consciousness, in the far country of our dreams. Nothing we do can hasten or prolong the arrival. The Moment arrives quickly and then is gone.



We've come around again to Advent, forgetting that the world into which Jesus was born was not so unlike our own. The world into which Jesus emerged was as unreceptive to his teachings and his kingdom as ours. He saw the desolations wrought by the powers of the world. He rose up against them, in solidarity with the weak and the powerless. Empires past and present have a way of convincing people that allegiance to the crown or to the State should be our highest aspiration, and that this is in the best interest of our safety and well-being.

We know better. We know that the powers of the world cannot save us. Christians everywhere wait each year in the hushed silences and shadows of Advent, hoping against hope that this will be the year, this will be the moment, when God's coming will finally break through our arrogance and delusion, our misguided self-reliance, our fear – and set us at last on the path of peace and justice. Isaiah wrote: *How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of the messenger who announces peace, who brings good news, who announces salvation.* We've come around again to Advent, friends. Open the gates. The messenger approaches.
