Making the Two One

Jesus saw some infants nursing. He said to his disciples, "These infants are like those who enter the kingdom of heaven." They said to him, "How then can we enter?" Jesus said to them, "When you make the two one, and when you make the inside like the outside, and the outside like the inside, and the upper like the lower, and when you make male and female into a single one, then you will enter the kingdom." [The Gospel of Thomas]



This is the time of year when we dare to imagine God appearing in the world as a nursing infant. Scholars tell us that the infancy narratives about Jesus in the gospels of Matthew and Luke are mythical accounts imagined by the writers, based on a variety of sources and traditions; they are fictionalized stories composed by people who were not present when Jesus was born. I agree with the scholars. It has been shown that the two accounts – Matthew's and Luke's – cannot be reconciled into one seamless story; there are too many discrepancies, contradictions. This is true.

And yet, there is something about the birth of Jesus that we *know* is true, in a way that transcends rational knowledge. There is something about this ancient Nativity scene that finds a place in our consciousness beyond intellectual understanding. Children know the way to that place, and perhaps the child within us still knows, because I think even as adults we search for ways to enter into this scene. Alice Miller once wrote: "someday we will no longer treat our children as creatures to manipulate and change, but rather as messengers from a place we once deeply knew, but have long since forgotten." This is especially true at Christmas. It is a truth that lives beyond historical truth, and reaches instead for the unfathomable mysteries of mythical truth. As children, we knew it instinctively. Remember?


The place we seek each year at this time is somewhere near the convergence of the divine realm and the human realm. The heart of the Christmas story is found where the two are made one. There are no glittery paved streets – only a dirt path that leads to a barn. And gathered in that

barn are all the people who *know*, like children, that mystery and wonder dwell within – alongside shepherds and angels and cattle, under a star as bright as any you've ever seen.

With the winter solstice now past, and the days of Christmas fleeing away, and the year turning to new year again, may we seek diligently for the Child who has come into the world, and who now walks the dirt paths and back roads of our lives, calling each of us by name and inviting us into his realm of peace and justice, compassion and mercy. The divine and human have merged, the two made one. The Holy Night has come and gone. We are the chosen ones now.







Dear all,

We have just finished a very successful first month at the **Seasonal Overflow Shelter.** We have been full, or within 1-2 open beds each night, ranging from 17-20 folks. We have had many excellent meals served, with many thanks to the meal teams who are participating! Our volunteer shifts have continued to fill up, but we are always interested in training new folks, especially to cover the 1am-7am shift. Some interesting statistics from our first month:

- 41 people served-32 men, 7 women, 2 transgender
- 29 client in community regularly accessing shelter (17 of whom are actively engaged in services)
- 9 people have moved through the area
- 17 people have income, 3 via employment, 14 through SSDI
- 2 folks relatively unknown demographics
- 0 calls to the Police Department


