INTERIM MINISTER'S COLUMN: Rev. Bert Marshall

Renewing Congregations

Skimming through some old document files, I discovered this pastor's piece I wrote for the February 2001 newsletter at the Lee MA Congregational Church. That's right: sixteen years ago I wrote this! Here it is in slightly edited (mainly shortened) form.

Last November, an issue of *The Christian Century* magazine featured some articles on the theme: "reconfiguring congregations." One of them, by Anthony B. Robinson, was entitled "Renewed Life." Robinson, who is senior pastor at Plymouth Congregational Church (UCC) in Seattle, sees seven ways that mainline churches are, or ought to be, changing:

From civic faith to the practice of transformation. Churches need to ask bottom-line questions, such as 'What is the deep purpose of the church?' and 'What is the purpose of our particular church?' People are seeking alternatives in a society that seems so destructive of human relationships and so afflicted with violence and greed. The church offers a way of life that is grounded in human transformation, healing, spiritual development, making disciples, faith in community. Material affluence has failed to satisfy our deep longings for purpose and meaning. "Those seeking a church today," Robinson writes, "need more than a committee assignment. They need and seek a whole new way of life."

From assuming the goods to delivering the goods. Robinson says, "Churches cannot serve a host of side dishes while neglecting the main course. Worship must be the central and formative experience in the life of the congregation. Today, the traditional and classical marks of the church – kerygma (worship and proclamation), didache (teaching), koinonia (community and fellowship), and diakonia (service) – must take precedence." These, after all, are the characteristics that make us unique, that make us church.

From givers to receivers who are also givers. We have been taught, out of context, that "it is more blessed to give than to receive," but it is also true that the giver occupies a position of control. We are accustomed to giving to whom and whatever we *choose* to give. Receiving, Robinson reminds us, whether it be material assistance or forgiveness, "makes us vulnerable." The church must learn to receive again —grace and forgiveness from others, and from God through the sacraments and rituals of the church. It's easier



to share when you know what it's like to receive what you're sharing. From that well of understanding and mercy, our giving takes on a new dimension.

From board culture to ministry culture. Many established congregations have elaborate structures of boards and committees set up to "run the church." Such structures were created long ago to imitate either corporate structures or voluntary organizations. Some congregations today are finding that this arrangement does not meet their needs, and so they are experimenting with new models in which members are asked "to be engaged in ministry rather than to run the church itself." Robinson reports that he knows a 900-member congregation "at which all but three committees have been abolished, replaced by a host of 'ministry teams.' Even in churches where such an innovation seems too drastic, board and committee members can be encouraged to develop an ethic of ministry. Church committees should frequently ask themselves: What is the big picture? How does our work connect with our story, our scriptures, our tradition?

From community organization to faith-based ministry. This is a reminder that the church is not just another civic or community organization. The world needs to hear something different from us. The world needs to hear the gospel from us. The work of the church is not just social or political or economic — it is also spiritual, faith-based, Christ-centered. We are disciples who are called to witness and service.

From seeing the budget as an end to seeing it as a means. Many churches try to survive by adopting an annual rallying cry of "making the budget." Robinson says, "It doesn't require extended reflection to see that "making the budget" is not a cry that is likely to capture people's imaginations." He continues: "When 'making the budget' becomes our goal, chances are that we are not asking the essential prior question, 'What are we trying to accomplish?', or 'What is our business?' Congregations must see the budget as a means and as a tool for ministry and mission. We need to break the pattern of letting the budget determine what is possible."

From passive to active membership growth.

Essentially, because mainline Protestant churches no longer have a guaranteed market share in their communities, it is more important than ever to reach out. Robinson's own experience points to a combination of outreach, hospitality, and shared ministries as a path to membership growth. People

are encouraged to invite others to church. Most of us, he suggests, can manage that stunningly simple phrase for calling disciples in the Gospel of John: "Come and see!" That's all you need to say. The outcome of the invitation



is not up to us; our task is simply to invite, and to welcome when the invitation is accepted.

Today, sixteen years later, nearly halfway through 2017, I believe more than ever that the mainline church *must* step out boldly in some new directions if it is to survive and flourish in the new century. Here are seven ideas for doing so. How might Centre Church respond? As we continue to move together through this transitional time, let us resolve to grow in the spirit, tend the garden of healing and transformation, walk together on the path of discipleship, sing the songs, listen to the stories — and *be the church* in bold new ways!

The World Council of Churches' Global Day of Prayer to End Famine was May 21, but a special appeal continues.

THE SITUATION

Famine has officially been declared in South Sudan and, for the first time in recent history, there is a very real possibility of four famines - in Somalia, South Sudan, Nigeria, and Yemen - breaking out all at once. Twenty million people face starvation within the next six months. International aid officials warn that this is one of the biggest humanitarian disasters since World War II. Increased investment in international humanitarian assistance at this moment is critical to help these people in crisis. In addition, we see that continued funding for peacebuilding programs that prevent violent conflict are critical pieces that help address root causes of poverty and famine.

To address the current famine, the global humanitarian community is ready to scale up the response to avert a catastrophe, but requires additional funds immediately to do so. Let's do our part through our prayers, generous contribu-



tions, and advocacy with the U.S. government to release emergency funding to meet the catastrophic needs of these four countries and support robust funding for diplomatic, development, and peacebuilding tools, which are critical to our security, and to the well-being of others around the world. We must act now, before it is too late.

Through IMA World Health we deploy mobile clinics, therapeutic feeding and medicines, and are supporting partners like Sudan Medical Care.

Let's Advocate -

Call for U.S. leadership to generate the funds needed to avert catastrophe. Urge Congress today to save lives in these four countries by maintaining robust foreign assistance funding as it considers the 2018 budget.

sion everyone was asked to put their name on at least two items they would be willing to follow up on/get involved with. I would like to take a moment to thank Holly Kennedy, Marion Abell, and Rev. Bert Marshall for their help in putting on the Brainstorming Session. A list of the ideas will be made available, and people will have an opportunity to collaborate on carrying them forward.

As you can see, there are plenty of things to keep us excited these next several months.

Anything we can give through our Second Sunday Offering helps them to better serve the children in their care. On June 11, all offering income not otherwise designated will go to Centre for Children. If you miss that week and still want to give, just clearly mark "Centre for Children Second Sunday Offering" on your check or envelope.

It's also the season for the UCC-wide Strengthen Our Church offering, so envelopes for this offering will be available through June for those who may choose to give.

Sunday, October 1, is World Communion Sunday, when we display international flags in the sanctuary, including the flag of El Salvador where our Sister Parish is located. BRATTLEBORO CENTRE for CHILDREN

In the past year Brattleboro Centre for Children hired 3 new teachers, all assistants, and rehired one who had taken the summer off. Fully staffed now, we look forward to being fully enrolled as well. As of this month we have 37 students enrolled, with room for 42. We hope to fill out spaces with new infant families.

Sharlene Braskie, the centre's Assistant Director, retired in January 2017, leaving a void in administration, professional support and centre history. Sharlene had been with BCC for 10 years, worked in all four classrooms as a lead teacher, and managed the centre as an Interim Director. She has offered to maintain a presence in the centre by doing a monthly nutrition curriculum for the preschool class and to "sub" for the office staff when needed. In her absence Nan hired Karen Cribari as an Office Manager. Karen comes from experience with Youth Services, bringing an understanding of young people, young families, non profits, and community based service work. She helps in the classrooms, giving teaching staff time for planning and meeting, as well as in the office.

After her surgery in June 2016, Nan recovered nicely and has since been able to return to full-time work (at a slightly reduced hourly workload). She was grateful for the church members' support and assistance in her recovery.

In November 2016, Bob Neubauer retired from his many years of being president of the board. James Cera, a church member and parent of two BCC children, stepped up to the position. Rev. Jack Bixby joined the board and Leah Bratton, an experienced Early Childhood center director and consultant, joined the board as Secretary.

In the preschool the curriculum this past winter was Travelling Around the World, an interest that arose from the children themselves when one 4-year-old came in asking "What are pyramids and where is Egypt?" From that exploration, they continued their "travels" to Italy, France, Spain, Ireland, Japan, China, and Russia, often choosing the next country to visit by the children's own curiosity (asking "What country is

that?" pointing to the world map on the wall). They have learned what the flags look like, studied art and architecture of each country, learned what animals live there and even studied cultural aspects like music and dance and traditional or historic clothing. They have made "passports," learned songs, read stories and eaten food representing these countries. It's been a wonderful introduction to cultural differences and building curiosity about the world outside of Brattleboro. Younger children's classes have focused on developmental skills, seasonal and local interests.

Donations continue to be of great value, particularly around feeding the children. We are members of the Vermont Food Bank and while we do order from them and contribute with a membership fee, that provides us with the opportunity to acquire many things free of charge as well. This helps our grocery bill as we provide 2 meals and snack daily, free of charge to the families. We also benefit from two meals a week that Loaves and Fishes prepares for us. We continue to have weekly donations of bagels from Bruegger's Bagels, a tradition that has continued for nearly 3 years now. With it we offer an opportunity for parents to visit the office and have coffee and a bagel with their child or with Nan. It's a nice time to relax, get to know each other, and catch up. In addition, Nan wrote letters to local sugar makers this spring, requesting donations of real maple syrup to provide that taste of real Vermont for our children. To date, 8 sugar makers have donated quarts of real maple syrup to the centre and we've had pancakes with real maple syrup twice so far! Of course, we also thank the many people (church members included) who donate ~Nan Mann, Director to us regularly as well.


Everyone is invited to a party for You're Invited! Virginia Knuebel on Saturday,
