#### INTERIM MINISTER'S COLUMN: Rev. Bert Marshall

#### Last Time Around

This will be my final Centre Bells piece as your interim minister. Three years ago I arrived here for an interview and walked into the parlor to face a rather large interim search committee – what was it, 12, 13, 14 people? I responded to your questions, we talked, I said a few things about myself. Some of you had concerns about the Gospel of Mark – that is, how could I be off touring around the country doing performances and still be your interim pastor? How would I respond to your situation? What were my ideas for church growth and vitality? I felt a lot of anxiety in the room, uncertainty about the future, some pain about the present, a sense of loss about a past that had somehow gotten away from you when you weren't looking. I left that interview holding some mixed signals, not knowing if you would decide to call me or not. I did two other interviews and waited to hear from you.



I've enjoyed these past three years as your interim minister. But at some level I've been waiting to hear from you all this time, still waiting for a sign that you are ready and willing to embrace meaningful change. We've done some good work, accomplished some good things. But the way forward requires an openness to change and innovation that we never quite achieved. The Church in our present day must learn how to be more agile, more able to respond to its surroundings, more skilled at evaluating and acting upon its potential, more ready to engage in theological reflection and prayer with regard to the signs of the times. The Church in our current culture must tend to its spiritual health and growth, must re-dedicate itself to community worship, must learn to recognize and fully welcome those who are seeking to be part of it. You have to take some chances, try some new ideas, risk becoming a new

church that doesn't look like you. I think we found some stability and hope during my time here. I wish we could have found the path to a more active re-visioning and renewal. That path still awaits you and is there for you if you will trust God to guide you.

Your people, your community, and your world are waiting to hear from you. What Word will Centre Church speak to them? What Word will you speak to the brokenness and injustice in our society? What Word of compassion or mercy will you proclaim to the poor and the marginalized? What Word of comfort and healing will you speak to the wounded and hurting ones? What Word of love will you speak to the lonely and the lost and the forgotten? What Word from God will be born into the world through the lives and voices of the people of this church? Your lives. Your voices.

I hope and pray that you will find your path. I hope and pray that the past three years will someday be seen as a stepping stone to a new flourishing here, a new era of faithful ministry. I hope and pray that through the grace of God you will find a new settled pastor who will walk with you toward a new incarnation of the Realm of God on Main Street in Brattleboro. If you really believe it can happen, it will.

I will miss all of you. Thank you for the many kindnesses you've shown to me and to Kare. Trust in God, follow Jesus, listen for the Spirit, pray without ceasing, and never give up the struggle for peace and justice!

### From Acting Council Chair, MARGO NEALE


Greetings to all,

#### **LOAVES & FISHES**


With many thanks to Suzanne Laliberte, the Loaves & Fishes CoolBot Room has been refurbished and is ready to be put back in duty.

For those of you who might not have made it to the "inner sanctum" of the L&F kitchen, the CoolBot Room houses the robot that serves as the kitchen's substitute for a walk-in cooler. The science is described here: <a href="https://www.storeitcold.com/how-it-works/">https://www.storeitcold.com/how-it-works/</a>

When the cooling mechanism was first installed, the room was not well insulated. Over time, the condensation ate away at the plaster walls and compromised them. Suzanne completely demolished the interior and reconstructed the walls, insulated them and covered them and the floor with water resistant materials.




